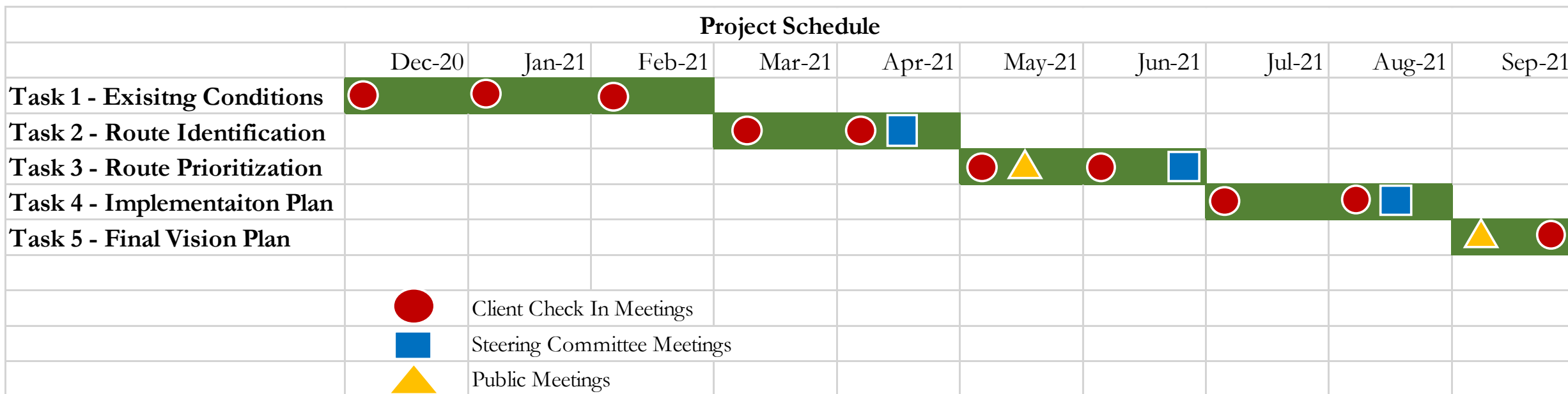


# Project Purpose

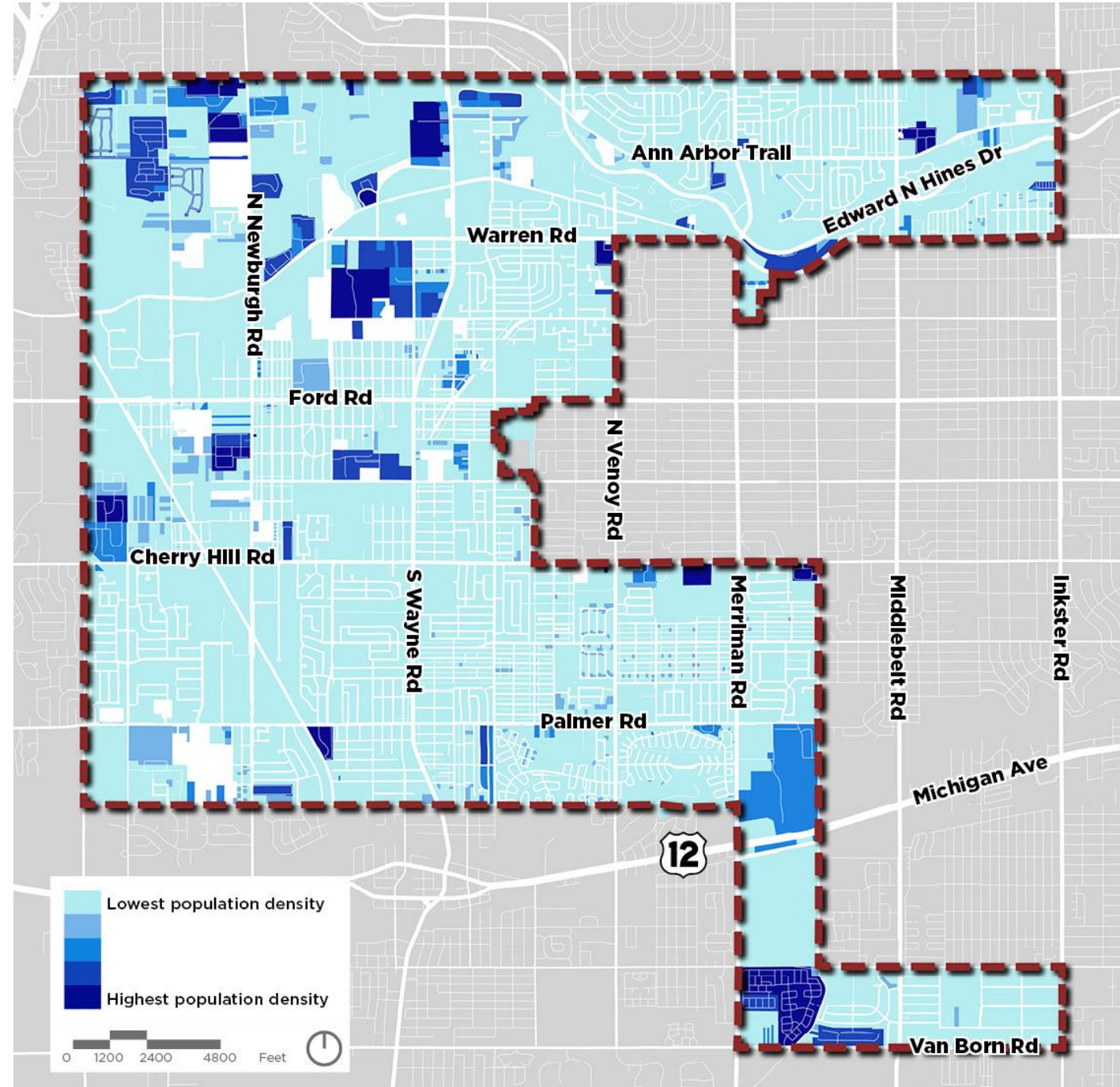


# What We've Found



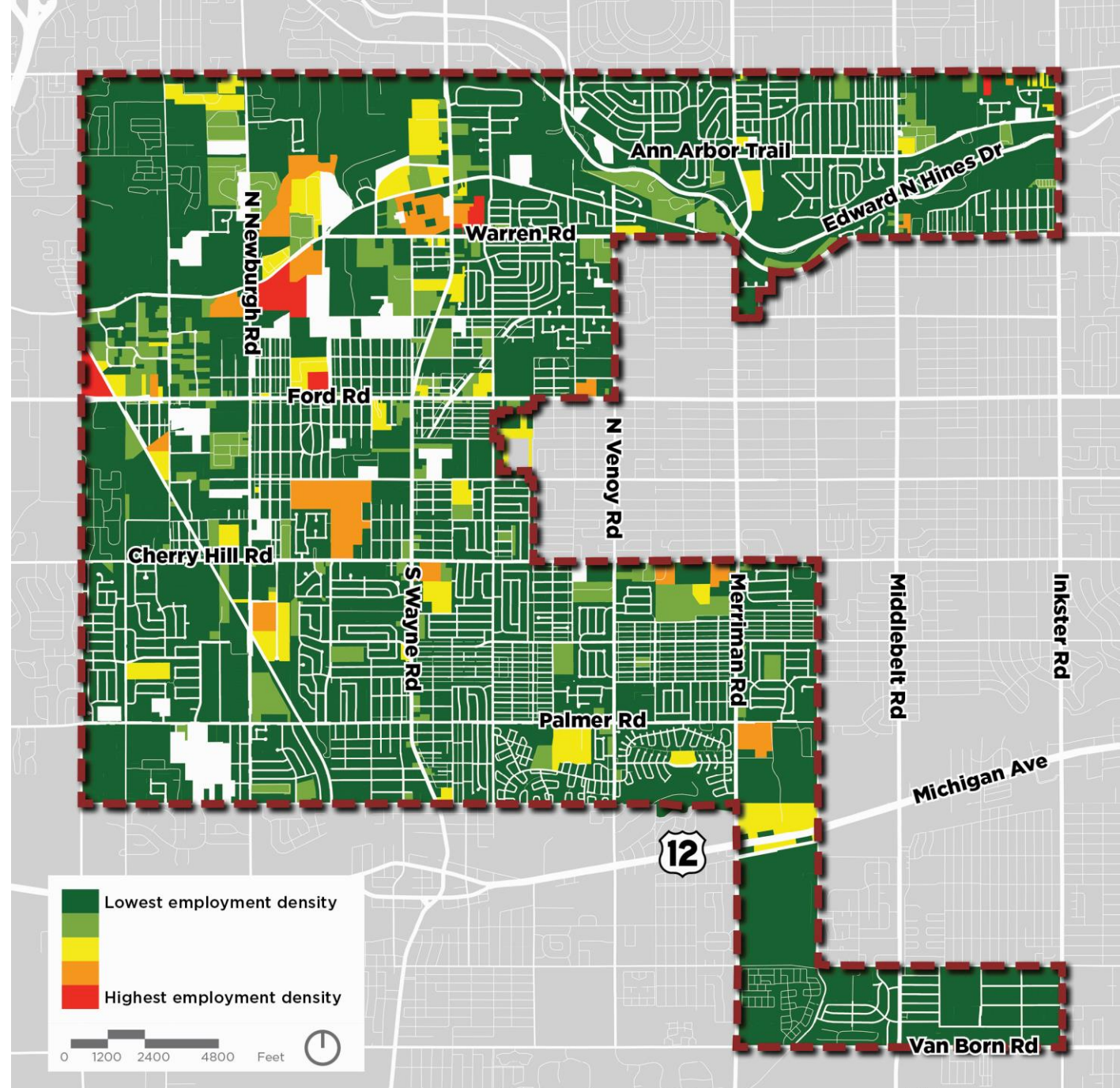
# Population Density

- Pockets of high density spread around Westland



# Employment Density

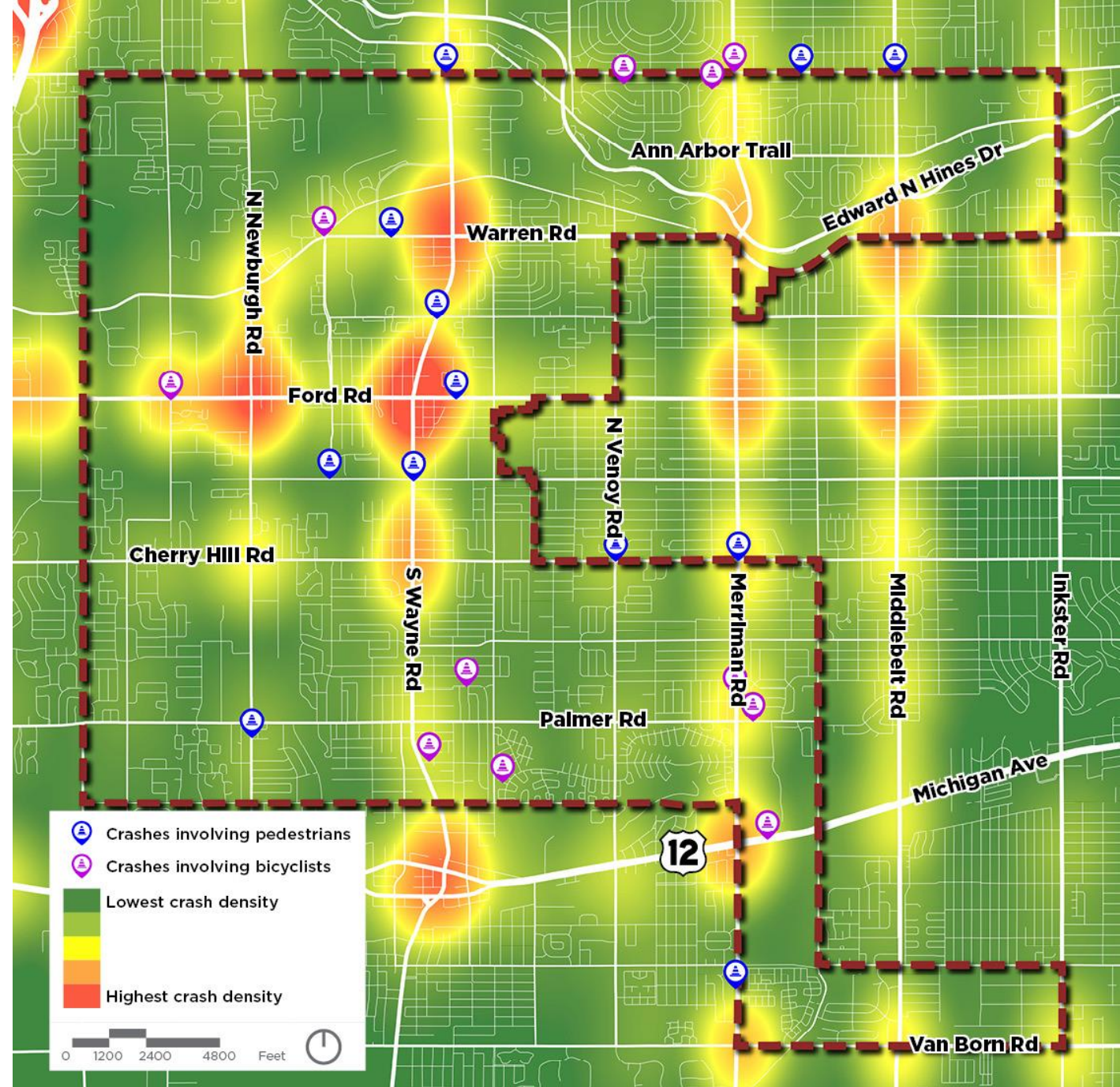
- Higher employment density located on the north side of Westland





# Crash Rate

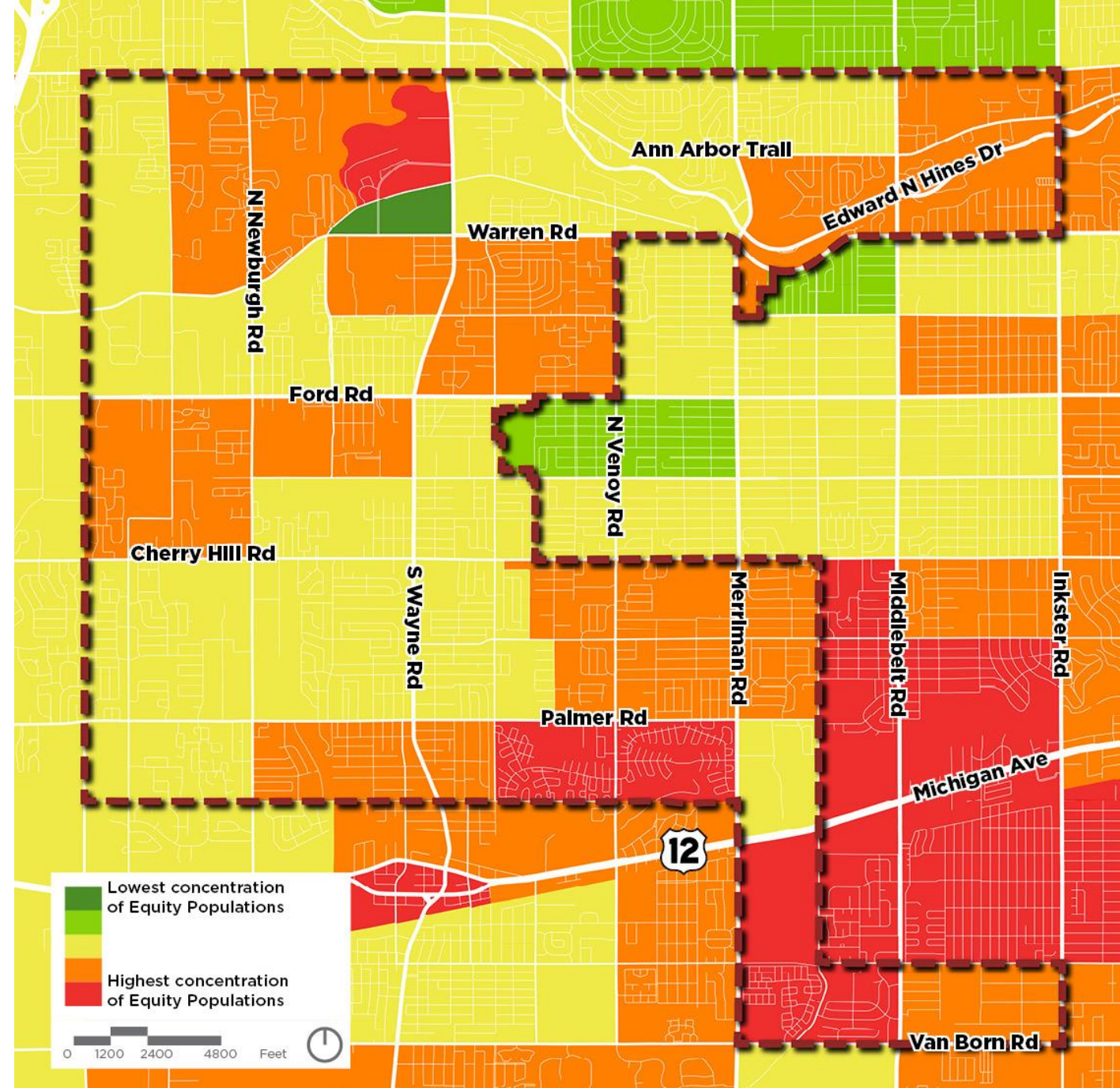
- Crash hotspots along Ford Rd and Wayne Rd
- Highest crash density at Wayne Rd and Ford Rd intersection
- Neighborhoods have very few crashes





# Concentration of Equity Populations

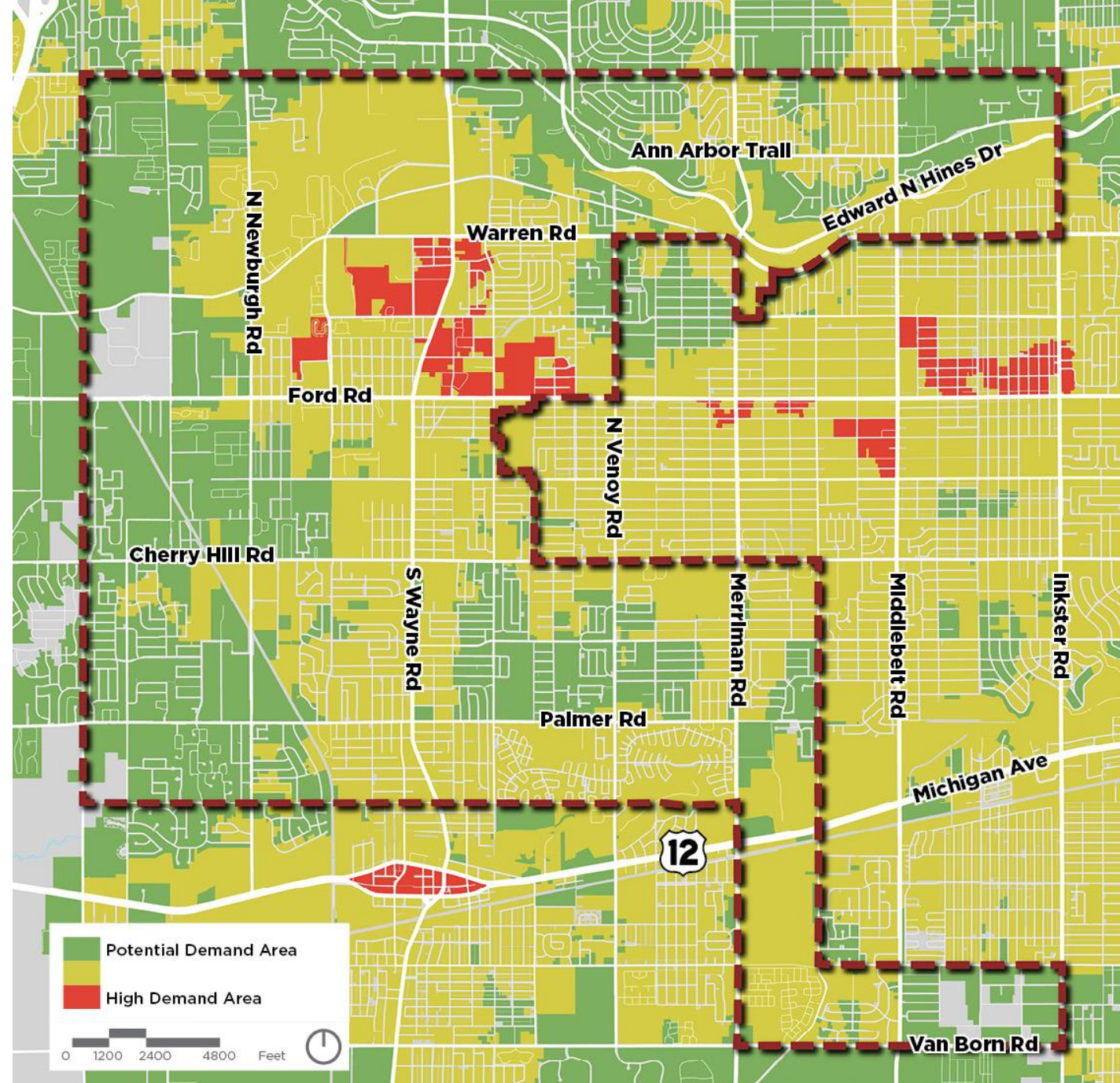
- High equity populations on the north and south sides of the City.
- Looking to connect these areas with non-motorized facilities





# Short Trip Demand Areas

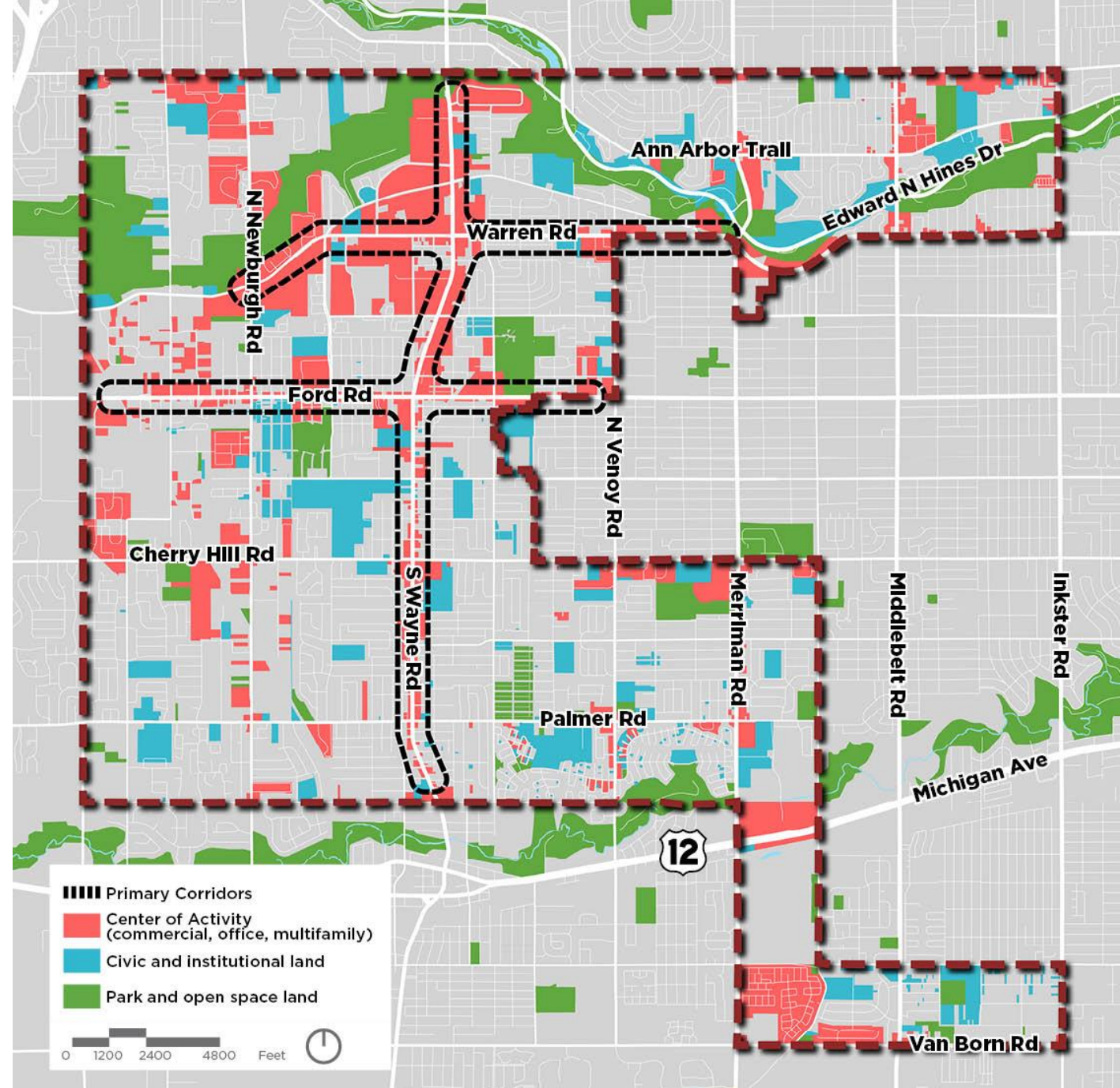
- Short trip demand areas are areas where walking and biking trips could replace car trips
- High demand areas between Newburgh Rd, Ford Rd, Venoy Rd, and Warren Rd





# Westland Activity Areas

- Commercial areas, civic buildings, and parks are major activity centers
- High concentration of activity centers on north side of City, near Warren Rd.





# Existing and Planned Non-Motorized Facilities

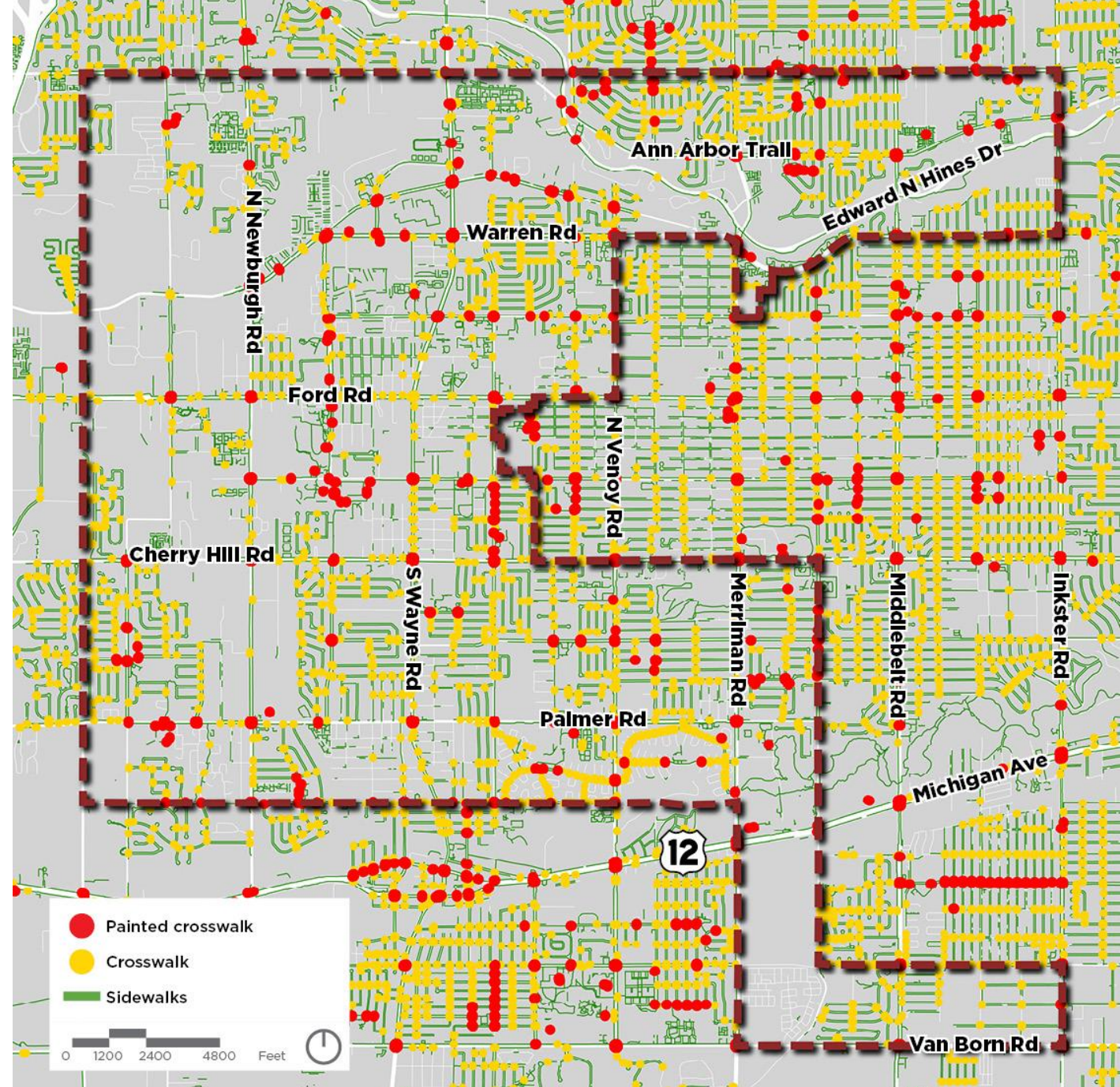
- Wildwood Rd bike lane coming this spring
- Planned facilities in Garden City and along Lower Rouge





# Existing Sidewalks and Crosswalks

- High concentration of sidewalks in neighborhoods south of Cherry Hill and north of Hines Dr
- Gaps in the center of the City

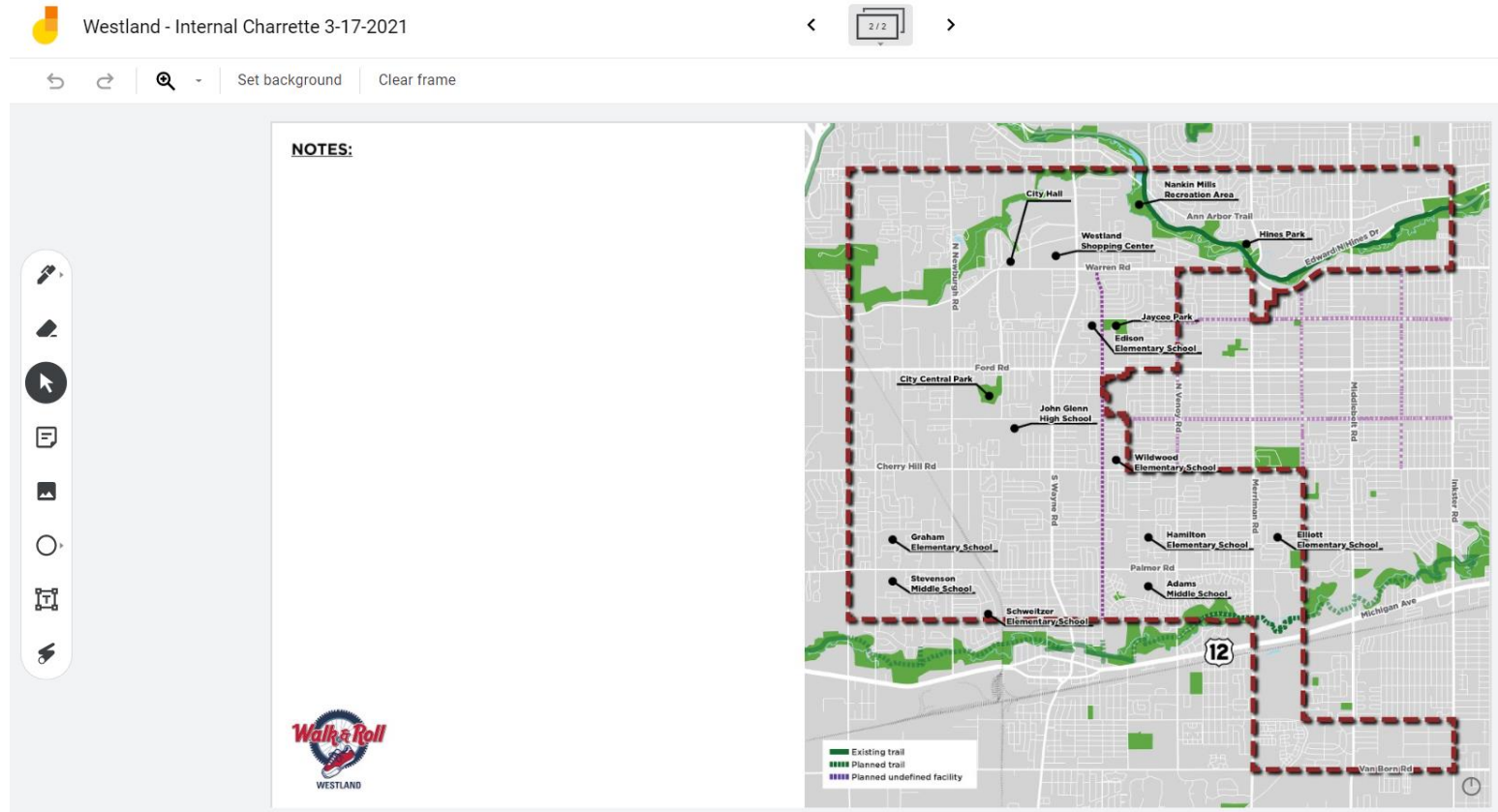




# Brainstorming
